"Children wear their curiosity and love of learning on their sleeves," she explains. "In my role at OPL, I can invest my own passion for life-long learning into supporting kids and families and help them to nurture that love of learning and "can-do" approach to life, so they carry it into adulthood."

Marie appreciates OPL's strong tradition of quality children's programming – from traditional storytimes and book-themed special events to the newer High Hopes early literacy program, which shows parents easy activities that help their babies, toddlers and preschoolers to develop important pre-reading skills. Marie earned her degree in library science at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, completing her field experience in the archives at the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh's Polk Library.
